I've noticed that many volunteer events have an age limit like 14 or 16, and while not all programs can be open to younger kids, it's equally important for them to have opportunities to volunteer and make positive changes in our community. To fix this, I will organize events like trash clean-ups and volunteer opportunities at Hartman Reserve and George Wyth State Park. In this way, I can achieve three goals at once by cleaning up our town, helping young people influence our community in a positive way, and teaching them responsibility.

After I prioritize the humans living in our city, I would turn my attention to the animals living here that don't have homes. Too many pets are either stray or living in shelters and this is a big problem not just in Cedar Falls but across the world. Recently, our local humane society announced that they have no kennel space available and they are not accepting any more pets. Fixing this problem can include setting aside funds to extend the humane society building, advertising, and creating an outreach program to inform people about adoption rather than expensive breeding programs and how to be a responsible pet owner so fewer pets are abandoned in the first place.

In conclusion, I would work hard to ensure Cedar Falls becomes a responsible, clean, and caring community for both residents and animals by improving transportation, providing volunteer opportunities, and providing homes for the pets that don't have them.
